Julia Ward Howe was a prominent abolitionist, activist, and poet most famous for writing "The Battle Hymn of the Republic."

- o Cardboard card with metallic edges:

I have read a firy [sic] gospel, writ in burnished rows of steel "As ye deal with my contemners, so you with my grace shall deal; Let the hero, born of Women, crush the serpent with his heel!" Our God is marching on.
