## Biographical Note

Jeremiah Frazier, born in Frederick, Maryland, in 1828, entered the Preparatory Department of Pennsylvania College in 1849, from the carpentry trade, and graduated with the Class of 1855. While in college, he was a member of the Phrenakosmian Literary and Debating Society. Following graduation, Frazier spent several years teaching while studying theology privately under the Rev. H. Bishop, Evangelical Lutheran Church, Emmittsburg, Maryland, and was licensed in 1859 by the Synod of Virginia.

He served as pastor at Middleway and Gerrardstown, West Virginia; Newry, Blair County, Pennsylvania, (1865-1868); Marklesburg, Huntington County, Pennsylvania (1868-1871); Cassville, Huntington County, Pennsylvania, (1871-1873); Blain, Perry County, Pennsylvania (1873-1881); and Portland, Jay County, Indiana (1881-1865). Jeremiah served on the Board of Directors of the Gettysburg Theological Seminary in 1876, representing the Central Pennsylvania Synod. He was the President of the first board of directors of the Orphans Home in Loysville, Perry County, Pennsylvania. He married Anna Mary Catherine Frazer (no relation) of Gettysburg, PA, in 1854 and raised eight children. Jeremiah died of typhoid fever, September 13, 1885.

# Scope and Content Note

One hundred and thirty one manuscript sermons, bound into thirteen volumes by Frazier's grandson, Dr. Chester North Frazier. In addition to the churches for which he was pastor, Frazier also delivered his sermons in other churches and venues. The sermons and their dates listed below are in the order that Chester Frazier bound them, dating their first delivery to the best of his ability. However, it is clear from the notation of towns and dates on the backs of many of the sermons that Jeremiah reused them several times throughout the years. While mostly steering clear of politics in his sermons, Frazier's

Thanksgiving sermon in 1863 comments on President Lincoln's proclamation to set aside and observe the last Thursday of November as a day of thanksgiving, the progress of the war, traitors, liberty, the coming peace, and the better and happier days ahead.
