

Biographical Note

Benjamin Cooper Fairchild (June 21, 1926 - October 19, 2010) was an Assistant Command Chaplain in the Navy active towards the end of World War II and during the Vietnam War. In 1966 and 1967, he came to Vietnam as a Presbyterian minister. His main duty was to host and guide important figures from the Navy when they came to visit Saigon. He was responsible for introducing them to Vietnamese culture and lifestyles, as well as military activities happening in Vietnam in 1966-67. To him, Vietnam is one of the episodes of his life that he wanted to forget the most. Despite having been through World War II, where he had served in the South Pacific and the Far East, Fairchild claimed that the Vietnam War was different from any pattern he had observed in the past, it created a sense of discomfort and unfamiliarity. Chaplain Fairchild believed that he and others were sent to Vietnam to help his the Vietnamese to gentrify their nation, bringing Vietnam to prosperity.

Scope and Content Note

This collection contains Benjamin C. Fairchild's personal possessions, including letters, maps, workrelated manuscripts, images, cut-out newspaper articles, drafts of *Farewell Vietnam*, and a copy of the book he wrote over the course of time he spent in Vietnam. All of these documents speak for the Chaplain's experience in Vietnam, of the life he had, of the relationships around him, and his character. While in Vietnam, he had been sending copies of all his correspondents back to his wife in the U.S. He thought they might be fascinating, as he described it to be "sort of touch and go." The letters reflect the best of his life during the years he served in Vietnam. There were thank you notes sent back and forth from the "distinguished guests" to chaplain Fairchild for his host during their Vietnam visit in 1966 and 1967. He often interacted with different positions in the Navy during his service time in Vietnam.

One letter was from Fairchild to his wife, dated several weeks after his arrival in Vietnam. In this letter, he wrote about what events happened prior to his assignment at the office, who was involved, and how he felt about it. Though the situation was not in his expectation, he did not feel irritated. If any, he thought the whole story worthy of discussion, which he did with his wife via letters.

All the handwritten and typed drafts for *Farewell Vietnam* and post-war lectures, which were based on his past notes during his service, contained not only Fairchild's experience and lessons about Vietnam's cultures, lifestyles, and religions but also his advice for those coming to Vietnam. These are highly valuable sources to further understand Fairchild's thinking and his stories of wartime. However, he seemed to have experienced cognitive dissonance in his viewpoints on the Vietnam War, and passed on these thoughts to whoever would read his book. The newspaper articles, coming from English publishers, were extracted and collected with intention. There are also two maps of Vietnam, and four pictures, two of which were probably taken in Vietnam. In addition, the collection also had addendums, reports, and documents of his chaplaincy work, which further unveiled his work life during his service time in the Vietnam War.
