CWI 2019 Close-Out, and Looking Ahead!

Thank you for a wonderful conference!

From Friday, June 14 to Wednesday, June 19, we welcomed over 350 attendees from 36 different states and 2 foreign countries to campus for the 2019 Civil War Institute Summer Conference. Included in this group were 10 high school scholarship recipients, 3 Scott Hartwig Public History Fellows, and 4 Robert J. Glass Teacher Scholarship recipients. Participants enjoyed 6 days of main-stage lectures, round table discussions, panels, and intimate dine-in and lunch-in discussions, as well as 17 different tours of battlefields and museums stretching from Gettysburg to Fredericksburg and Chancellorsville, and from Antietam and the "Mosby Country" of north-central Virginia all the way up to Harrisburg. Our high school scholarship recipients and other youth attendees enjoyed a special 3-hour battlefield tour of Gettysburg with CWI Director, Peter Carmichael focusing on the letters of soldiers who fought at Gettysburg; the high school scholarship recipients also participated in a variety of other special programming, including a small-group article discussion with CWI faculty member, Dr. Jim Broomall, and a 3.5 hour historical simulation of the 1863 New York City Draft Riots with CWI's Assistant Director, Ashley Whitehead Luskey.

Ranging in age from 8 to 89, this year's conference attendees listened to and engaged in critical conversations about the long Civil War era with 39 faculty members, including noted scholars Gary Gallagher, Ed Ayers, Carol Reardon, and Peter Carmichael, as well as renowned tour guides Dennis Frye, Wayne Motts, and Jennifer Murray, among others. Featured conference topics ranged from Nat Turner's Rebellion and the political crisis of the 1850s, to the material culture and written correspondence of the Civil War era, from the tactics and terrain of the Atlanta Campaign and the life of Confederate artillerist Edward Porter Alexander, to the slave refugee camps of Civil War America and the creation and evolution of Gettysburg National Military Park. Attendees closed out the conference in style at the circa 1870 farm of David and Cynthia Salisbury, where they enjoyed home-brewed beer, live Civil War era music from the Dearest Home Band, catered desserts, and a gorgeous sunset over historic Marsh Creek.

It was a memorable week for attendees, faculty, and staff alike. We would like to thank both our wonderful faculty for sharing their scholarly expertise with our guests, both on and off the stage, as well as our attendees, whose enthusiasm, passion, intellectual curiosity, and positive energy helped to create such a successful event and so many enriching discussions about the history and memory of the long Civil War era. We so enjoyed catching up with old friends, as well as making new ones!
