

APPC GUIDELINE FOR THE M.I. REQUIREMENT

Given the increasingly porous boundaries between divisions, and the increasingly interdisciplinary nature of several fields, no course can automatically qualify for any Multiple Inquiries (MI) requirement of the Gettysburg Curriculum. However, if a course being offered falls within one of the following departments, programs and/or concentrations among our three divisions, it is **likely** that such course fulfills the following Multiple Inquiries requirements of the Gettysburg Curriculum as listed below.

However, anyone may instead apply for a Multiple Inquiries requirement [outside](#) of these divisions using the appropriate form (see [here](#)). All FYS must use this form if they want a course to count for Multiple Inquiries.

APPC will review and make a final decision on any MI requirement application.

Notes:

1. The interdisciplinary programs such as Africana Studies (AFS), East Asian Studies (EAS), Environmental Studies (ES), Latin American Caribbean, and Latino Studies (LACLS), Public Policy (PP), and Women, Gender, and Sexuality Studies (WGS) may decide on the various MI requirements provided they have faculty members in their program trained in multiple disciplines.

2. Some Psychology courses may count for MI-Social Science or Natural Science.

3. An IDS course can count for the MI requirement fit for the training of the instructor/faculty who is proposing the course.

4. Only Cinema & Media Studies courses not cross-listed with other departments count for MI-Arts.

5. The linguistic courses in Spanish may count for MI-Social Science.
