Research Experience for Undergraduates Program in Crime Analytics to the University of North Carolina at Charlotte. This NSF summer program is designed for undergraduate students who want “hands-on” research experience and for those who are interested in pursuing graduate degrees or careers in fields such as Computer Science, Criminal Justice, Crime Analysis, Analytics, and Data Science. The program is targeted to undergraduate students who are rising sophomores and juniors. **Ten students** will be selected to participate, and students from underrepresented groups are strongly encouraged to apply. The **Pennsylvania State Historic Preservation Office** is seeking an **archaeological research intern** to help with the development of a proactive, statewide survey program: the Pennsylvania Archaeological Site Survey (PASS). This will be an exciting opportunity to conduct research and analysis of existing statewide survey models, and the work will feed into a feasibility study and proposal for the expansion of the current PASS program. The internship will include: research, analysis, and writing; mapping and data entry in CRGIS; and participation in archaeological survey and outreach efforts as the schedule allows. Foxfire Internships: Focus on Appalachian Heritage

Applicants must be in their senior year of study, a recent graduate, or currently enrolled in a graduate program. Candidates should be self-motivated and familiar with cultural heritage, but consideration will be given to those coming from related disciplines, including history, anthropology, historic preservation, architecture, archaeology, environmental studies, public history, or education. Ideal candidates will have strong research, writing, and public speaking skills. Interests in historic skills or specific elements of Appalachian heritage are a plus. Applicants should be comfortable in the outdoors, as leading tours throughout the museum campus will be part of internship duties. REU: Conflict Management and Peace Science

University of North Texas REU: Conflict Management and Peace Science is accepting applications from students through April 5th to engage in graduate-level research in conflict management and peace science in a senior faculty-mentored, in-residence, eight-week, Summer Research Experience (SRE) that integrates training in civil conflict management with training in Geographic Information Systems (GIS), and training in research ethics. Participants develop theoretical propositions that are tested empirically. Participants collect and analyze empirical data and report their findings in a public forum. Activities include workshops on theory development, research methodology, and the graduate school application process.
